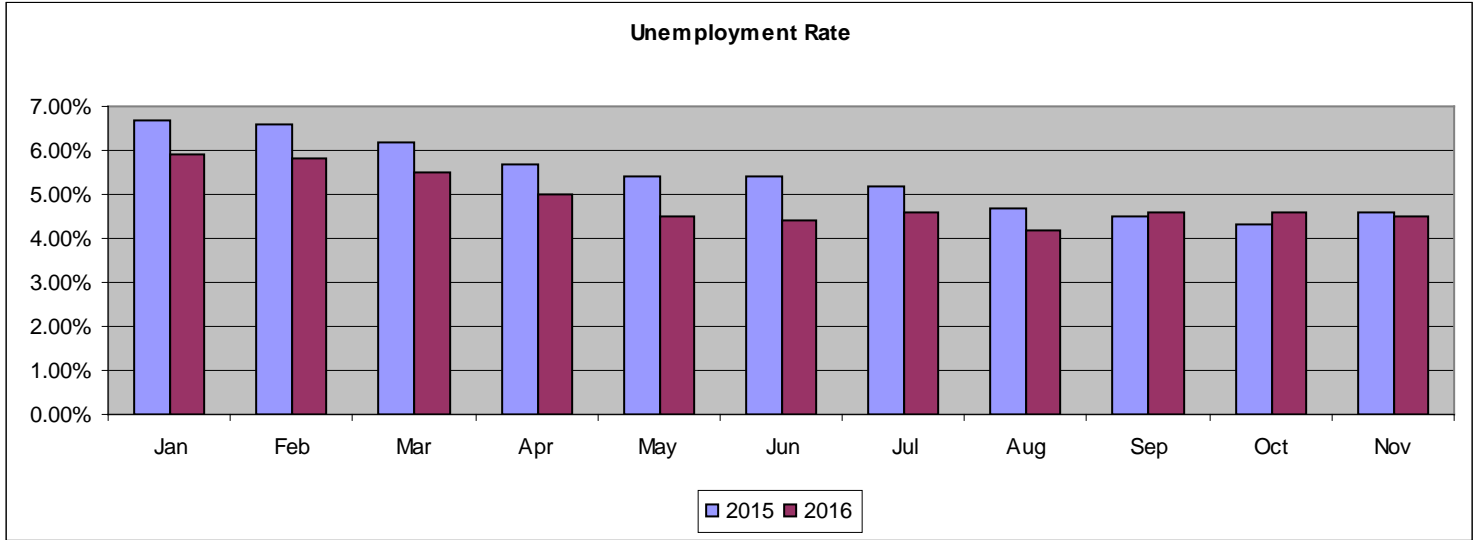
These are all long standing contracts with the Youth Bureau. Mr. Snyder reviewed each of the contracts for the Committee. The new Youth Court Director is doing very well.

Ms. Davin distributed the senior recognition packets to those supervisors present and the Clerk will distribute the rest. There was also discussion on the projected meal plan in the annual plan. They have seen consistent increases in the congregate meal program. The home delivered meals are not as consistent because more and more seniors are getting enrolled in the Medicaid long term care plan, which, many times opens up more options.

Program/Agency Updates:

Health Promotion:

The Matter of Balance series offered at the Mount Morris nutrition site concluded in December. Sixteen seniors participated. Thirteen out of sixteen participants earned certificates by attending five or more of the eight classes. We are in the process of scheduling our next series now.

Chair yoga at the two pilot sites was very well received.

Tai Chi for Arthritis will be offered in Geneseo from 1/17 until 3/9/2017. This is the first Tai Chi series and will be facilitated by one of the volunteers trained in September 2016. As of 12/20/2016, the class was full with a waiting list.

VITA/Volunteer Income Tax Assistance: We do not have a start date or schedule as of yet for the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance project through SUNY Geneseo.

Health Insurance Information Counseling and Assistance Program: The Open Enrollment Period for Medicare closed on December 7, 2016. It was a busy season for LCOFA.

Staffing: We are looking to fill two part-time Caseworker Assistant Positions as two staff people who were on leave will not be returning and have resigned.

Data System: All notes/units from the “Dark Period” (8/1/2016 – 9/15/2016) have been entered into the new Statewide Client Data System to meet the 12/31/2016 deadline.

CENTER FOR NURSING & REHABILITATION – FRANK BASSETT

Pre-approved Informational Item(s) To Be Reported

1. FINANCIAL/OPERATIONAL UPDATES:

- a) Occupancy- As of December 27, occupancy was 97.4% for the month, YTD 97.5%. This was right at budget.
- b) Cash Flow – The CNR’s Cash Flow Report as of December 27 reflects \$18,021,811. in reserves. Mr. Bassett explained that he was able to transfer back to the County the 2006 subsidy received by the facility. He is very optimistic that those monies will be received. All of end of year costs have been transferred to the County Treasurer.
- c) Budget Variance – The October 2016 budget variance reports will be distributed and discussed at committee. We do have revenues that exceed budget by over \$300,000 through October. Mr. Bassett reviewed the Workers Comp report for the Committee.
- d) Mr. Bassett reported on the labor management meeting held in late November on a variety of issues when an employee is out of the building during their shift. We have a right to recall an employee from a paid break. Mr. Bassett discussed emergency management plan and situations where employees did not show up to perform their role. This is a County paid break and the County also has a liability if something were to happen. He has received a MOA from CSEA and he has signed it. A memo was put out to staff at 4pm last Thursday and he met with his department heads and neighborhood managers on the MOA the following morning. This is to ensure the safety of the employees. The one allowable case would be if there was essential medication in an employees’ car. The log from Sunday to Monday there were numerous entries to get meds from their car.
- e) Noyes Dialysis Extension Clinic – Noyes and LaBella Associates representatives have met with Director Bassett, Anthony Jarzyna, Director of Rehabilitative Services and Tom Helles, Building Maintenance Foreperson to review drawings for the proposed Dialysis Extension Clinic. The current plan is to have 5 stations and a private room. CON submission to the NYS DOH will follow completion of final schematic design. A joint delegation from Noyes and the County may travel to Albany to discuss the proposal with the NYS DOH Bureau of Architecture & Engineering Review prior to CON submission. A schedule for fall 2017 program opening remains.

Mr. Bassett thanked the Board for their continued support. We are very lucky in Livingston County. The leadership that continues.

Mr. Davis was at the facility on Christmas and commented that Mr. Bassett was at the facility wishing everyone Merry Christmas.

Staffing

Deputy Director David Lee Terry and Molly Geffords have started during the month of December.

Molly comes to us from a joint Workforce Development and DSS venture. Their programs compensate and support Molly in gaining work experience in order to become more marketable to potential employers.

Process improvement

We have started to use a new office automation program called VetraSpec. This program is not only user friendly but makes reporting workload data and statistics easier. This software is needed when we switch over

to direct electronic filing to the Department of Veterans Affairs. This program replaces the one we currently use and is only \$50.00 more per year at \$800.00.

Our office will be digitizing all records that need to be retained by law. All supporting documentation that can be shredded will be shredded. Our office has 11,960 discharge forms and 15 filing cabinets full of documents. Our consumers to include funeral homes will benefit from our new organizational methods. All new claims will be scanned as they are produced and all old files will be scanned as work load permits.

We are pursuing a program called COVER To COVER this is a VA best practice program that connects older veterans to earned resources. This program trains county employees in methods of connecting all resources and can pay for a full time employee for a period of one year's salary.

News effecting local veterans

The VA is expected to announce the location of the new VA hospital that is to replace the Westfall Rd. location in Rochester on December 22nd. I was informed by the Director of the VA in Canandaigua that it will be convenient to 390 in Henrietta.

The VA's Office of Rural Health based in Washington DC has released that there will be 214 million dollars this year in funding to reach more rural populations. We are working with Congressman Chris Collins office in attaining more Home Based Primary Care providers to deliver primary care to house bound veterans in Livingston County.

The VA will restructure prescription drug copays in February.

This new regulation eliminates the formula used to calculate future rate increases and establishes three classes of outpatient medications identified as Tier 1, Preferred Generics; Tier 2, Non-Preferred Generics including over-the-counter medications; and Tier 3, Brand Name. Copayment amounts for each tier would be fixed and vary depending upon the class of outpatient medication in the tier.

These copayment amounts will be effective February 27, 2017:

\$5 for a 30-day or less supply - Tier 1 outpatient medication

\$8 for a 30-day or less supply - Tier 2 outpatient medication

\$11 for a 30-day or less supply - Tier 3 outpatient medication

New laws effecting veterans

On November 28, President Obama signed the following bill into law:

Introduced in the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs H.R.5392 - No Veterans Crisis Line Call Should Go Unanswered Act is described as follows.

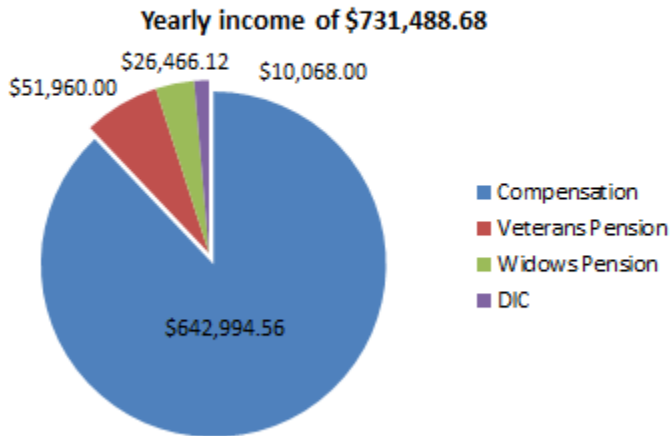
This bill directs the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to develop a quality assurance document for carrying out the toll-free Veterans Crisis Line (VCL), which shall: (1) outline performance indicators and objectives to improve the VCL, including at backup call centers; (2) include time frames to meet such indicators and objectives; and (3) be consistent with guidance issued by the Office of Management and Budget.

The VA shall develop a plan to ensure that each telephone call, text message, and other communications received by the VCL, including at backup call centers, is answered in a timely manner by a person, consistent with the guidance established by the American Association of Suicidology. The plan shall include guidelines for periodic VCL testing.

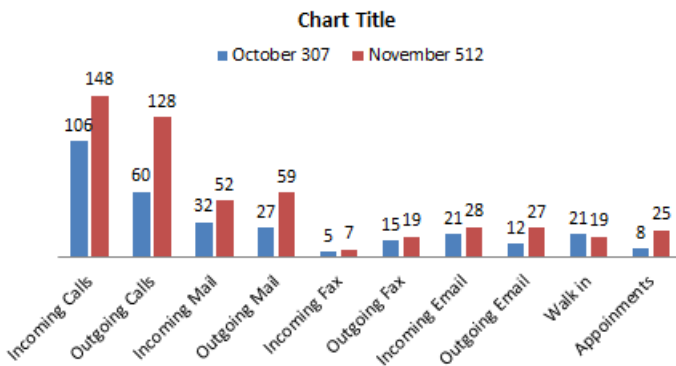

Awards from October 15 to October 16

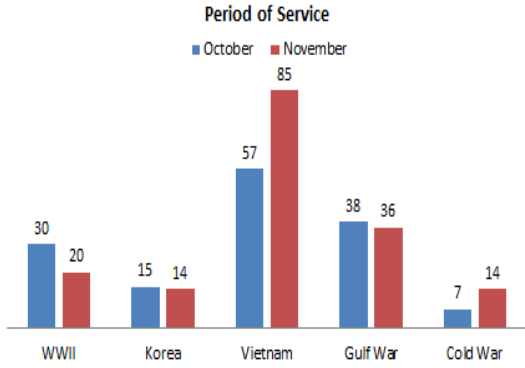

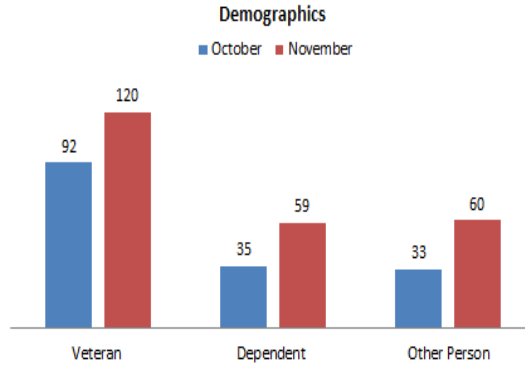
October and November Contacts



Era of Enquiry

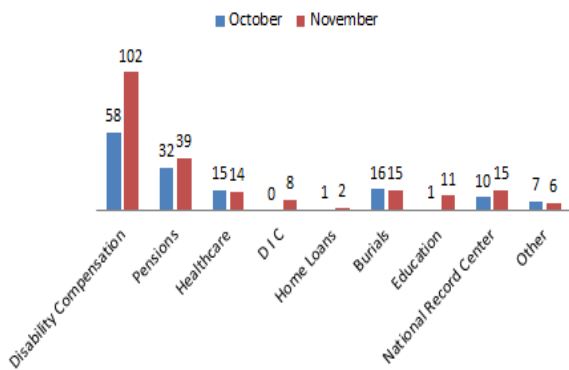


Persons Enquiring

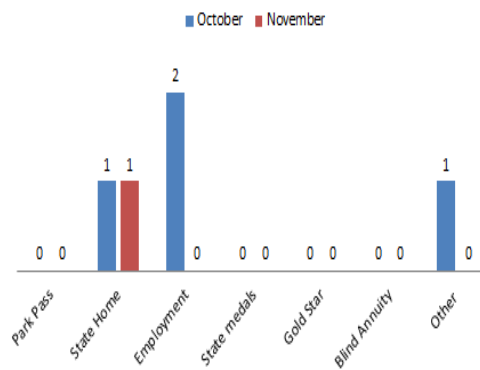

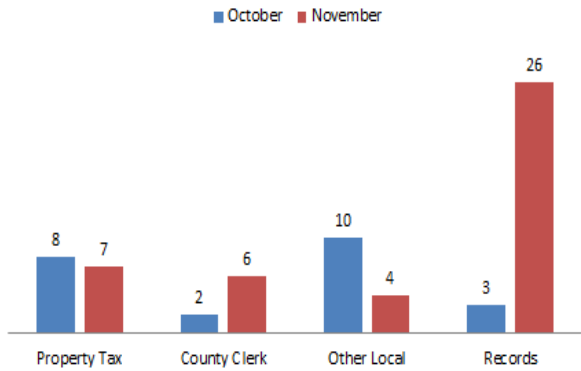
Federal Benefits



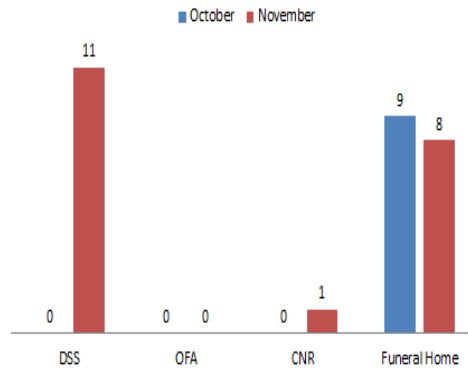
State Benefits
